


**ALERT MESSAGE FROM LSU ALUMNI
AND JKOMS FOUNDATION**

LSU Health New Orleans School of Dentistry opened the Advanced Clinical Care and Research Building on May 23, 2018, on its campus at 1100 Florida Avenue. The \$31 million, 64,899 square foot building houses \$2.5 million of medical equipment, 4 clinics and research labs. "It is the first new permanent building on our campus since the school was originally completed in 1972," noted Dr. Henry Gremillion, Dean of LSU Health New Orleans School of Dentistry. Dr. Larry Hollier, Chancellor of LSU Health New Orleans, said, "The new facility more than quadruples our capacity to provide excellent dental care to patients and

expands our clinical research and trials that offer patients the very latest treatment advances. Patients will also benefit from closer collaboration and easier consultation among multiple dental specialists working side by side." The 22-chair Faculty Dental Practice will provide care in general dentistry and all the dental specialties.

The area also contains a consultation room, laboratory, sterilization rooms, a reception area and business office. The Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery Clinic has 9 surgical treatment rooms, 1 diagnostic room with a cone-beam CT unit, a laboratory and consult rooms. The Outpatient Surgical Center features 2 state-of-the-art operating rooms with pre- and post-op areas, a nurses' station and a sterilization area. The Clinical Research area boasts 5 dental operatories, a reception area, laboratory, business office and conference room. The new facility will enhance research capacity, in both basic science research as well as clinical research and clinical trials, offering patients and participants the very latest treatment advances. For patient convenience, the building features covered parking and a covered patient drop-off area. It also connects to the other buildings on campus.

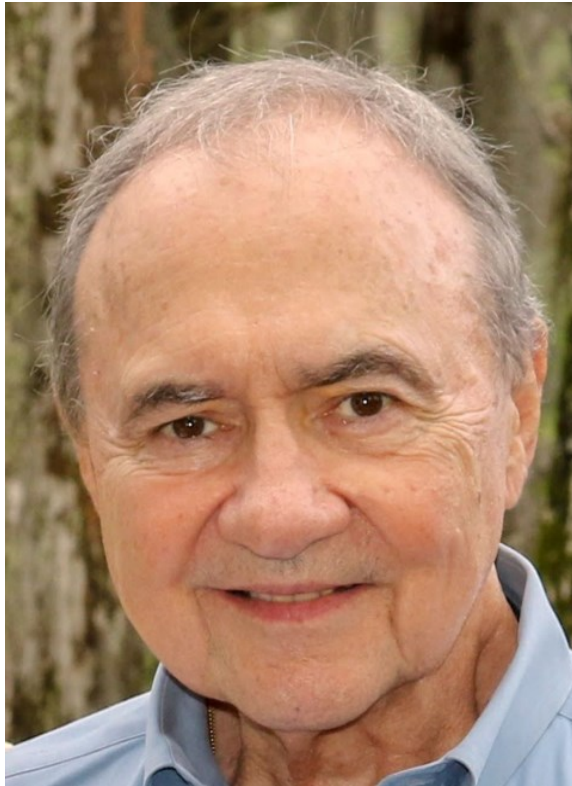

I feel my LSU training story is unique. I wanted to share it as I reflect on all that has happened. After surviving the culture shock of moving to New Orleans from the Midwest, I slowly shed my quiet nature and became a well-trained LSU OMFS graduate. The major influences in my training were Michael Kinnebrew, Jack Kent, Dale Misiek, Mark Smith, and Richard Akin. All different, all good surgeons and each giving me a part of their knowledge. However, it did not end there; I stayed for 3 more years enrolling in the LSU School of Medicine and obtaining my MD but was able to operate even more while doing so. Serving as first assistant to Drs. Kinnebrew, Kent, and Misiek, I participated in over 200 more major OMFS surgeries while in Medical school and after I had already finished a great residency.

The general surgery and Neurosurgery service that knew me as a chief resident the year before treated me as a resident instead of a student. I was totally immersed in training, completing a cosmetic fellowship with Dr. Kinnebrew before I left New Orleans for Ohio. I decided to do another year of general surgery in Cleveland close to where I intended to practice. This created an unusual scenario, where surgeons who thought I was an intern, saw me display surgical abilities equal to that of their 4th and 5th year residents. I was offered advanced standing for an open spot, but declined, as my wife was tired of being the wife of a resident. The unintended result was when I started private practice, all of these medial colleagues referred me patients to the point of having an extremely expanded scope practice for 21 years.

Although the financial rewards were very good, I was lured back to LSU by Dr. Kent and Spagnoli. I had hoped to be program director and just operate with and teach residents. When asked to become chair I obliged and worked my tail off to move the OMFS program into the new UMCNO hospital replacement of Charity. I developed great relationships with all departments at the hospital and re-established OMFS's prominence there. Although I was unable to get along with the dean, I hope I at least bestowed knowledge on 5 years of residents and successfully positioned LSU OMFS in the new medical center. Good luck to all and thank you for allowing me to be a part of practicing and teaching the LSU OMS way. *John*

Richard Kelly Akin was born in Little Rock, Arkansas on October 18, 1944. At the age of 9 months, he was adopted by Wilburn and Helen Akin. The family moved to Shreveport, Louisiana. His Dad was an accountant for Arkansas Louisiana Gas and Helen was a homemaker. These wonderful parents made sure that Richard was raised Catholic and received a quality education at St. John's grade school and Jesuit High School. He participated in swimming and football and graduated from high school in 1962. After graduation, he moved to New Orleans to attend Loyola University. In 1967, he married the love of his life, Joan Nina Tipery and had two wonderful children, Richard Tipery Akin, DDS, MD of Baton Rouge and Kelly Susan Gilley of Sandy Springs, Georgia. His children's spouses, Bridget Stampley and Matthew Gilley are remarkable parents and life partners. His children have blessed Richard and Joan with 6 grandchildren, Sarah, Julia, Rich, Jason, Tyler and Anna. He received his college education at Loyola in New Orleans and Centenary College in Shreveport. He graduated from Loyola Dental School in 1968. He received his Oral Surgery training at Charity Hospital and obtained his oral and maxillofacial surgery certificate in 1971. After graduation at age 26 he was fortunate to practice in Algiers, Louisiana and Bay St. Louis, Mississippi until a week before his death. He was honored to be on the staff of Ochsner Hospital and Clinic for 26 years. He was a Clinical Associate Professor at LSU Department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery his entire professional life. He has always loved dentistry, privileged to care for his patients and having the opportunity of working with many very dedicated physicians and dentists. He belonged to numerous dental and oral and maxillofacial surgery organizations and was devoted to his family and oral surgery his entire life. He was entering his 47th year of private practice.

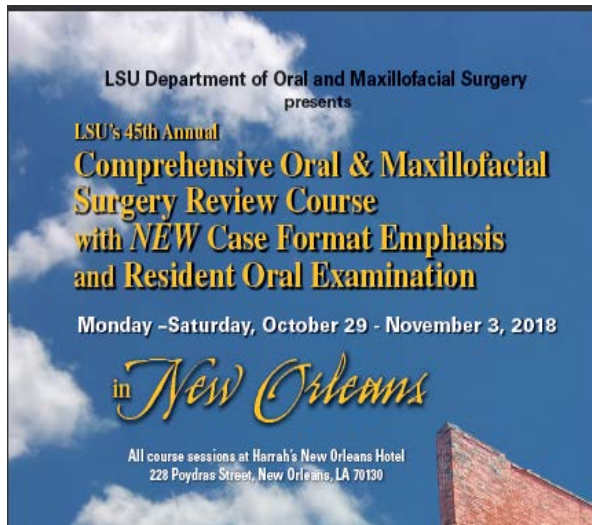

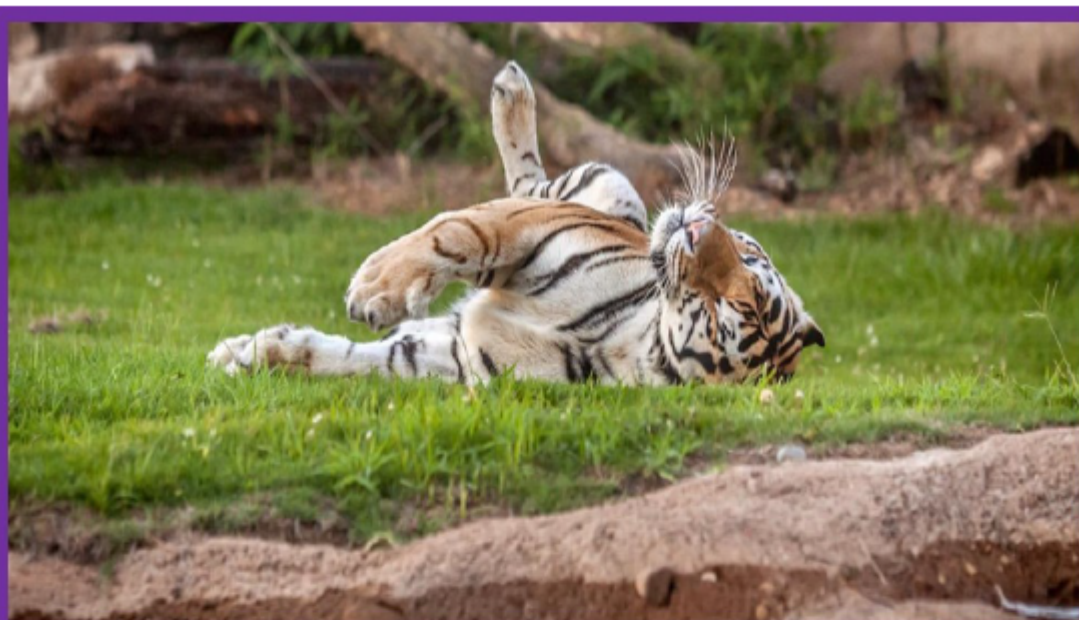

Individuals who are age 70½ or older can make gifts of up to \$100,000 directly from their IRA accounts to one or more qualified charities, without paying federal income tax on the withdrawal. If you wish to make a gift or if you're fulfilling an existing pledge to the JKOMSF, you may want to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution.

Here are the specifics.

- Donors must be age 70 ½ or older at the time the gift is made.
- Donors must request a direct transfer of funds to a qualified public charity.
It is important not to withdraw the funds before making a gift.
- Gifts cannot be used to fund a gift annuity or charitable remainder trust.
- Each donor may give up to \$100,000 per year.
- Gifts can be used to satisfy the donor's required minimum distribution.
